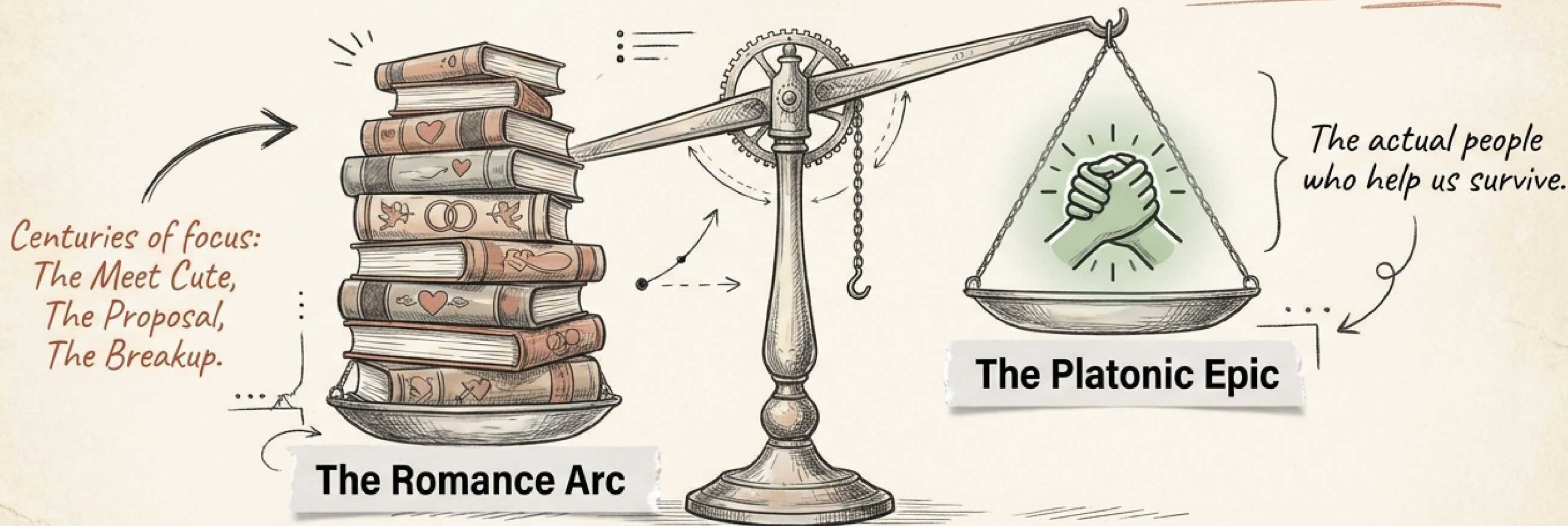

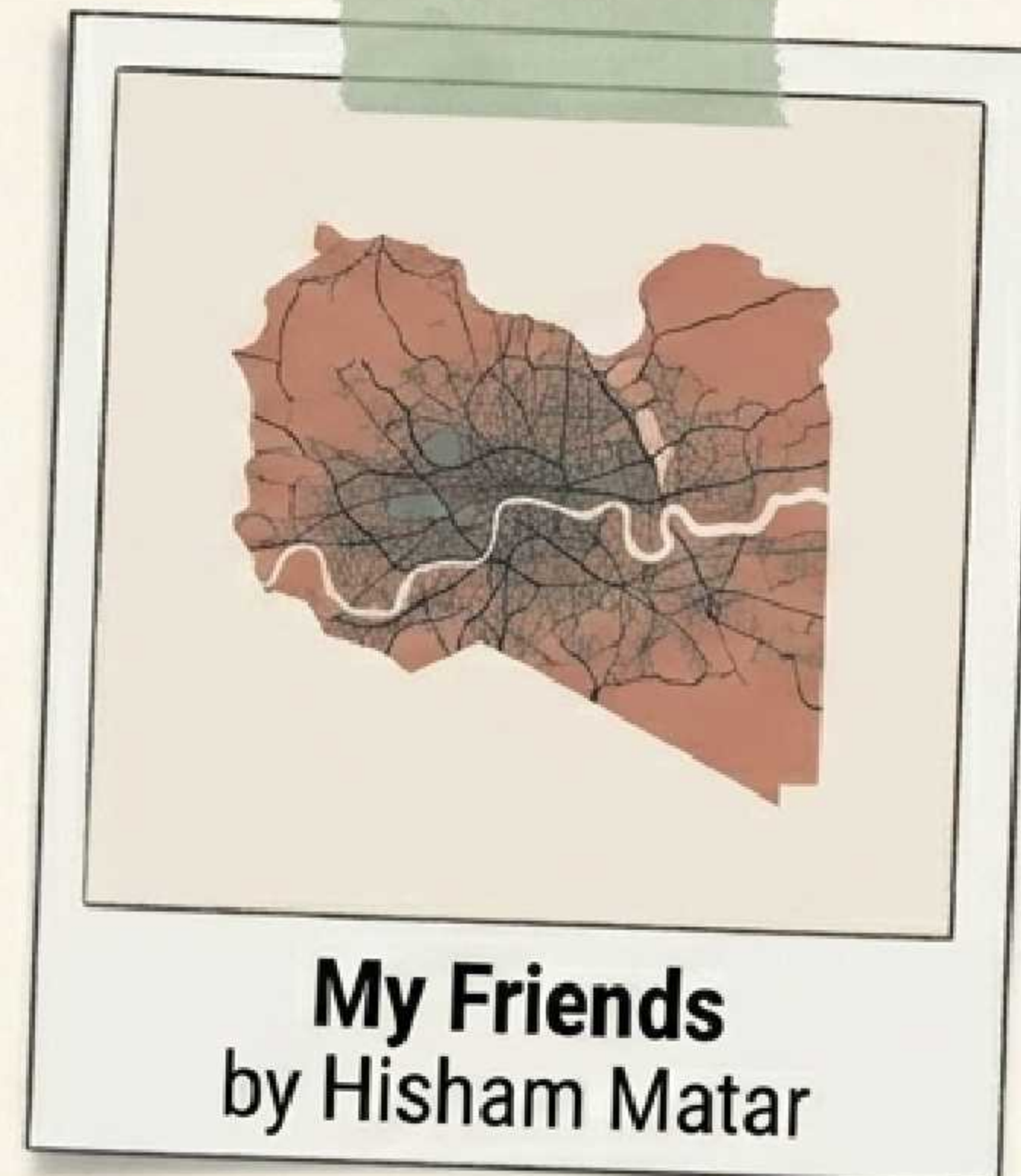
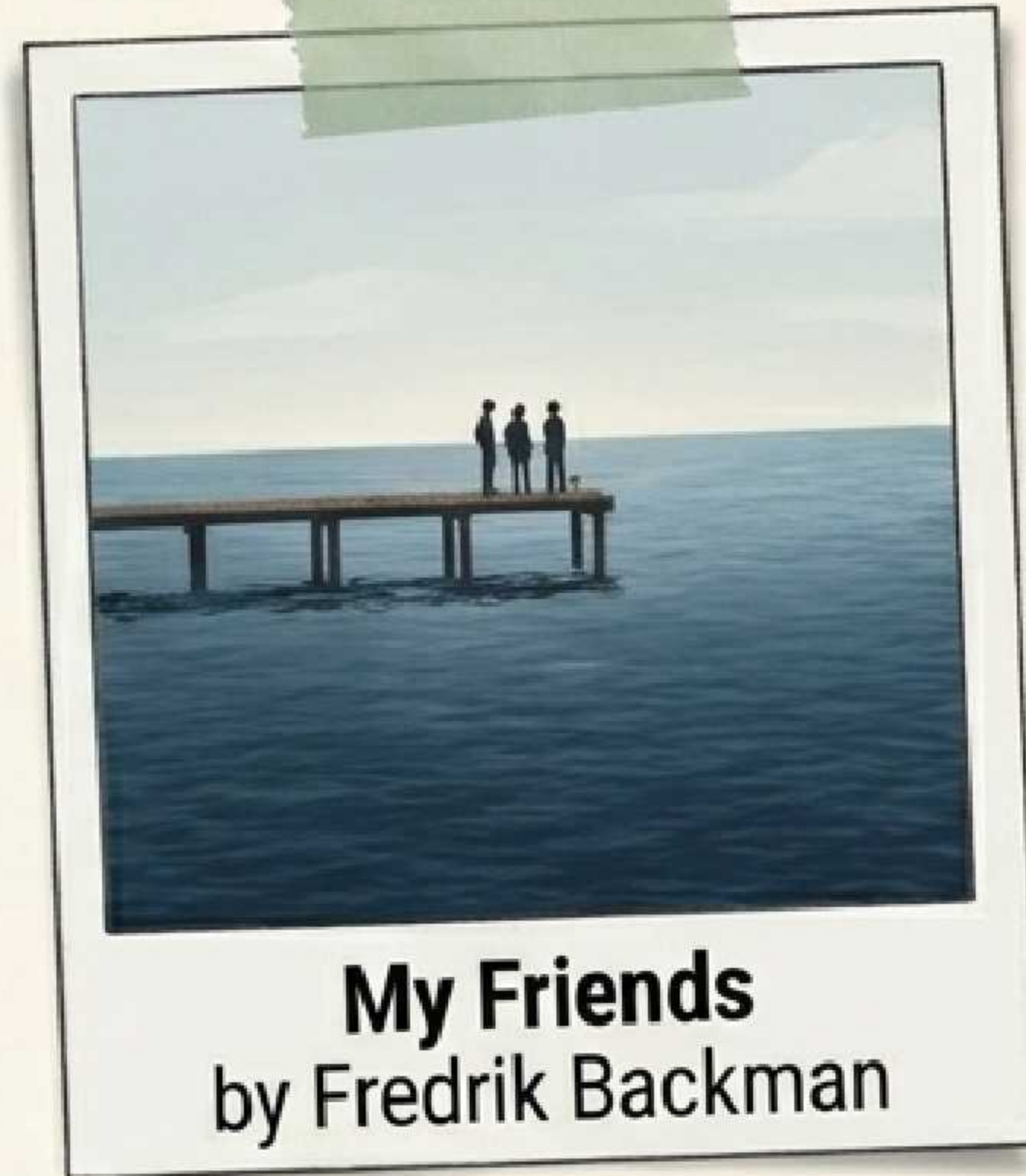
Why does fiction obsess over the marriage plot while ignoring the scaffolding of our actual lives?

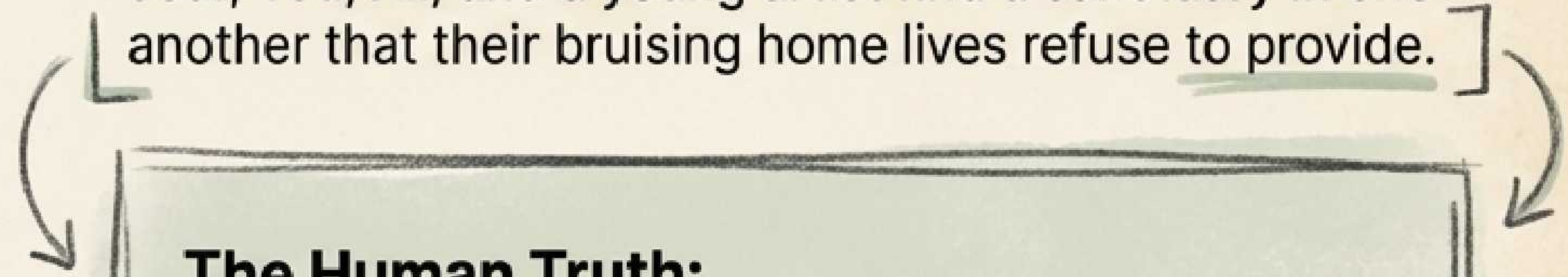

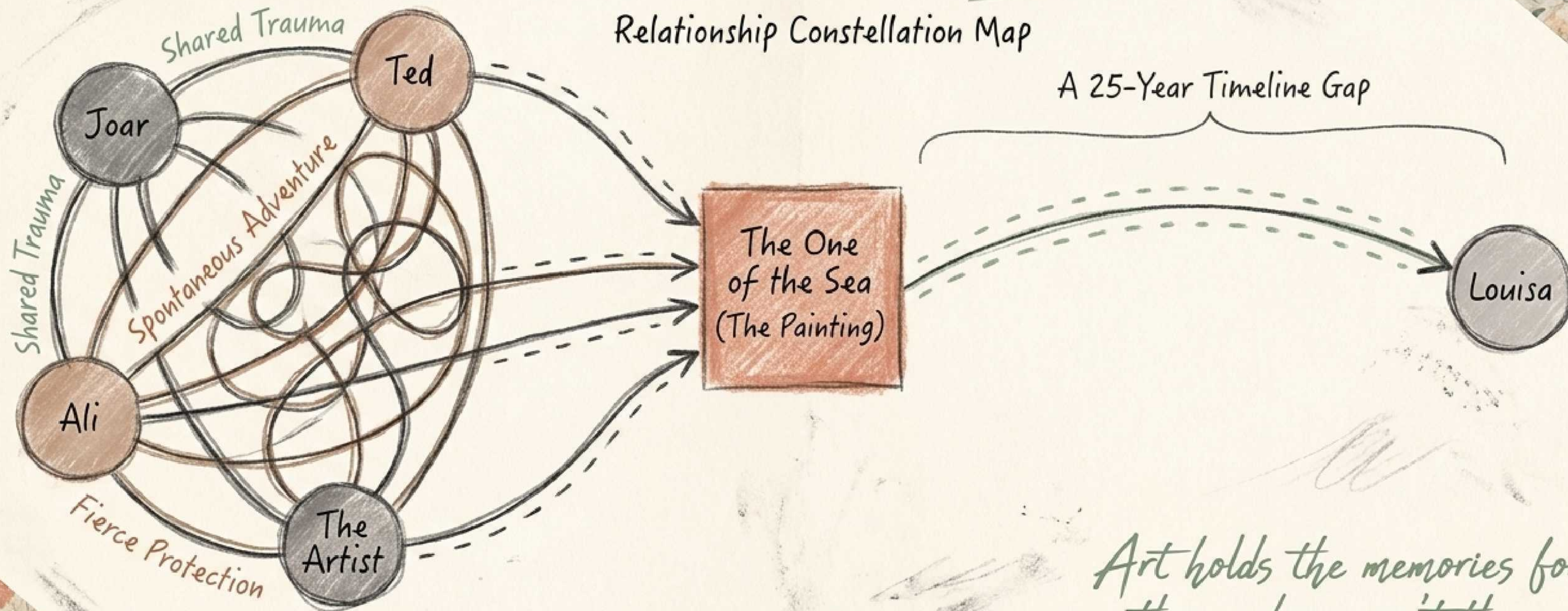
The Human Truth:

Following the 1984 Libyan embassy shooting in London, Khaled, Mustafa, and Hosam are thrust into an agonizing state of permanent exile. Unable to return home and fearful of putting their families in danger, these three men become a proxy homeland for one another.

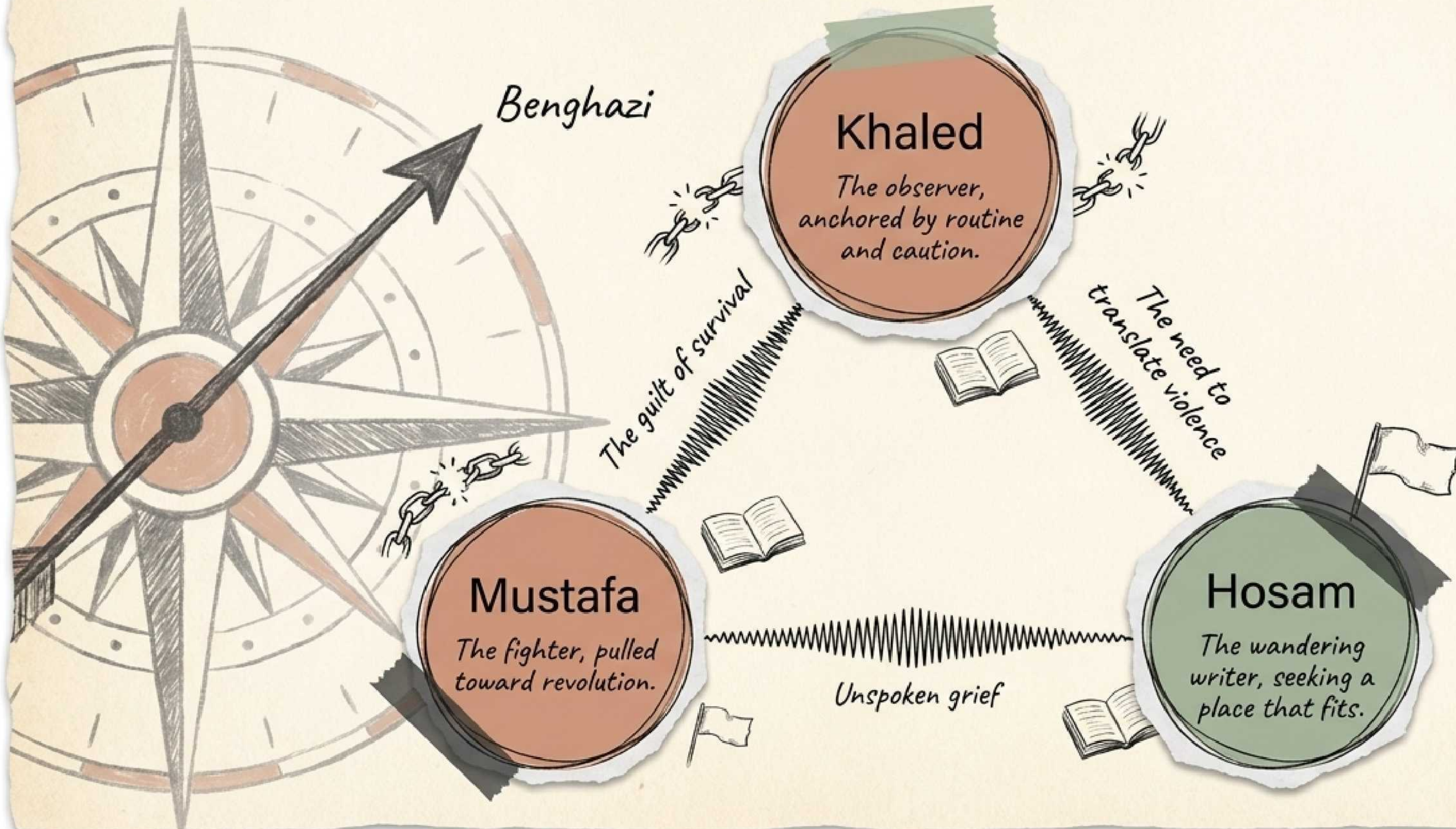
The Human Truth:

The Covenant Between Kin. Matar explores the unbearable weight of a friendship that is your only connection to your history. When friends are bound by shared trauma and political displacement, the relationship becomes an unbreakable cord—a sanctuary that occasionally feels like a cage as time frays their distinct identities.

Surviving the decadal thicket in Angela Flournoy's *The Wilderness*

Between 2008 and 2028, five Black women—Desiree, Danielle, January, Monique, and Nakia—navigate the dizzying transition from young adulthood into midlife. Across New York and Los Angeles, they face gentrification, maternal anxieties, and shifting careers not as isolated individuals, but as an interconnected ecosystem.

The Human Truth:

Friendship as an Ecosystem. Flournoy dismantles the myth of individual resilience. She reveals that the “wilderness” of modern adulthood—its economic instabilities and personal heartbreaks—can only be survived through community. These women are not just friends; they are the load-bearing walls of each other's lives.

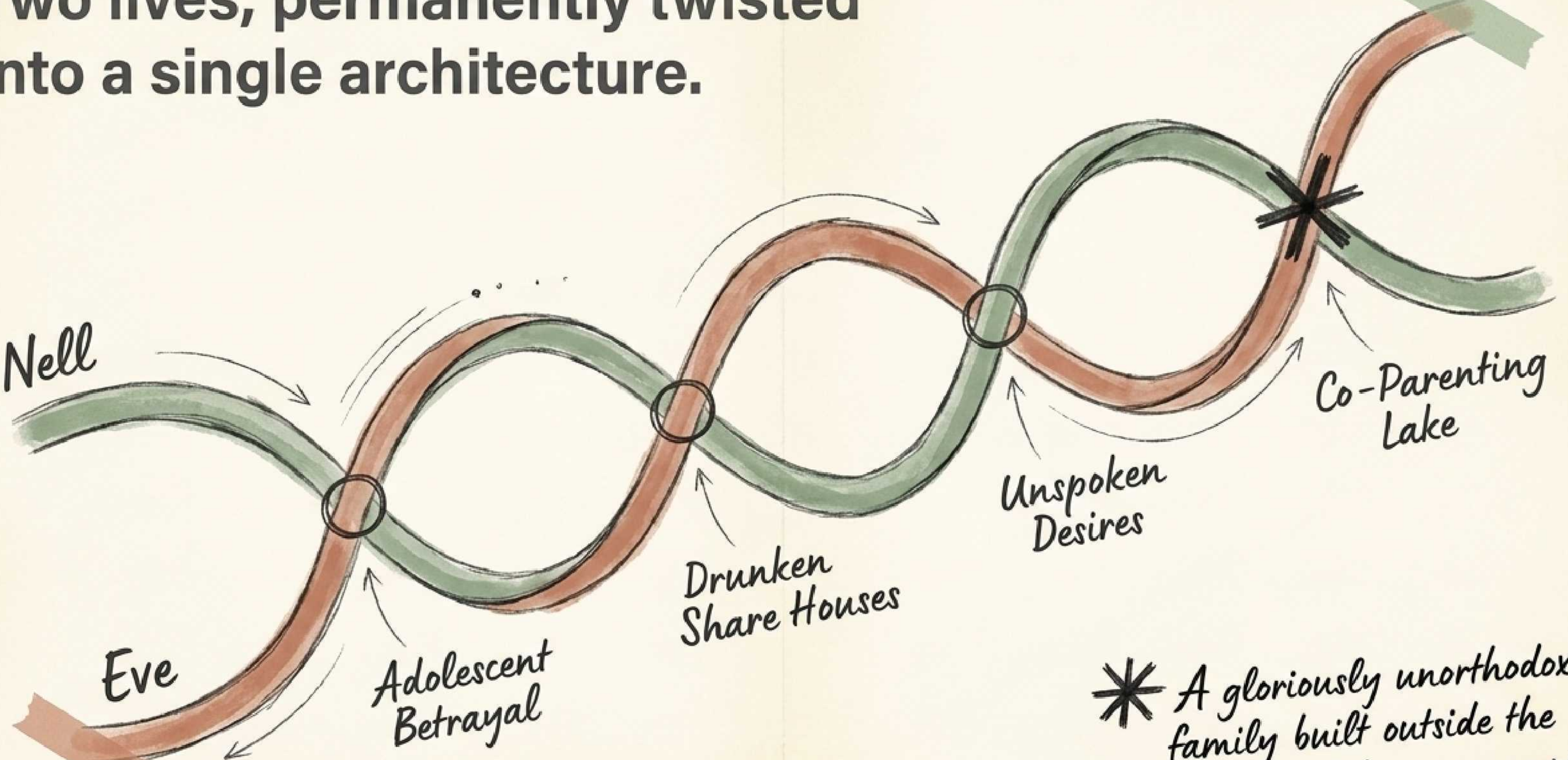

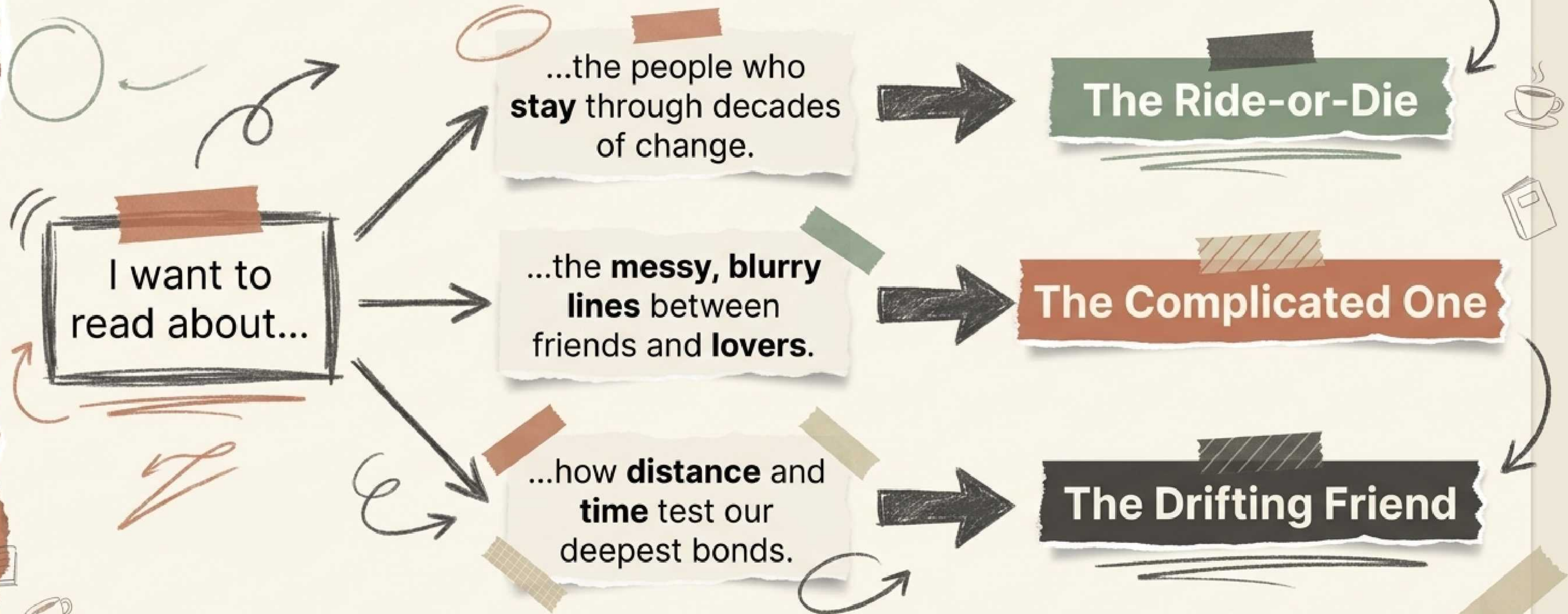

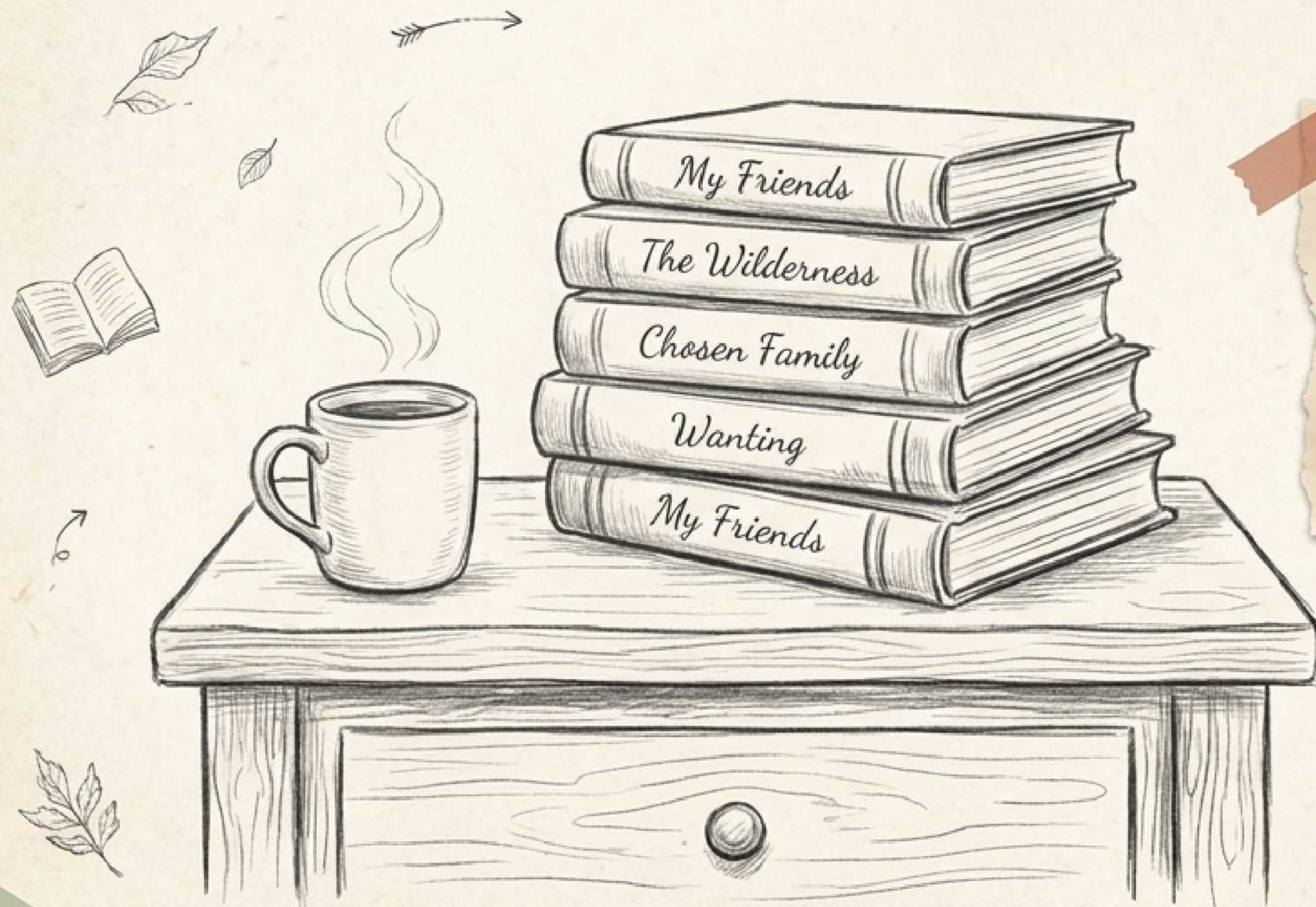
